Another Winning Season for Camp Success

Now in its 13th year, Camp Success, the flagship project of the Waco Scottish Rite Charitable Foundation, continued its winning streak with another successful camp. The four-week summer program is conducted by the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders at Baylor University and is targeted to children with reading and learning disorders. The 2015 event, held during the month of June, served 63 students and enlisted the assistance of over 30 graduate and upper-level students at Baylor University.

Since the program's inception in 2003, the Waco Scottish Rite Charitable Foundation has contributed over \$900,000 to its operation, with this year's donations totaling over \$87,000.

Camp Success is the name of the Waco Scottish Rite sponsored summer camp for treatment of children with language, dyslexia, and language-based reading impairments. The program is run the by Dr. Mikaela Ritter, who is the Director of Language Literacy Clinic at Baylor. Camp Success is only a part of a broader community outreach program run by the department, which treats a variety of voice, speech, and learning disorders such as stuttering, dyslexia, dysarthria, and articulation and phonological disorders; as well as disease- or injury-related conditions resulting from brain damage, laryngectomy, Parkinson's, ALS, Huntington's, MS, and cochlear implants.

In all of the programs, Dr. Ritter and



her team utilize the talents of Baylor students for their various community clinics, including those for neurorehabilitation, audiology, and language and literacy.

The collaboration with the Waco Scottish Rite was pioneered in 2003 by III. Claude Ervin, 33° IGH, who still maintains an active role in the program. For more information, contact Claude at claude_ervin@ baylor.edu, or visit Baylor's website at http://www.baylor.edu/csd/index.php?id=50610

Mason Reynolds' Success Story

Despite the best efforts of teachers, parents, and family, Mason was struggling in school. His grandfather, Mike Reynolds (33° IGH Member of the Waco Valley), said they tried everything. "We even went back to the basics, 'See Spot Run,' books like that, but it didn't help him. He was to the point where he avoided playing games if there was reading involved."

Together with his son Marc, Mason's dad, they enrolled Mason in Camp Success. Mike had one condition: "I told everybody that we are not doing this unless we are all in." The family drove their travel trailer from Cookville, TX (near Mt. Pleasant) and parked it in Waco for the duration of the fourweek camp. Various family members rotated taking time off of work to support Mason's education. He received his certificate in a ceremony on July 3.

"One thing they did was give him little shiny rocks every time he succeeded," continued Mike.


"Mason treasures those pebbles because he earned them."

After the school year started in August, Mason's teachers were so amazed at his improvement, that they contacted Mike to find out more about Camp Success. "Cookville teachers are have been calling me interested in the program," says Mike, who reports that several are interested in enrolling in the "First Flight" classes, which trains instructors in implementing the Scottish Rite reading program.







Library and Museum Notes by Casey D. Stanislaw, 32° Chairman of the Collections Committee

The Hiram Clock

Among the many interesting artifacts in the collection of over 2000 items in the Lee Lockwood Library and Museum, this piece is unique. The "Hiram Clock" is hand-made, one-of-a-kind, stands about three feet high and weighs approx. 25 pounds. It was donated to the museum in 1969 by John A. Mitchell, although it has been in a box in the basement for many years. Mitchell's grandson, John L. Reynolds of Fort Worth, says that the clock was made in 1905, and that his grandfather bought it at an auction in New York and spent 3 years restoring it.

To call it simply a clock is a disservice, as telling the time is only one of its features. The piece is actually divided into four parts, each of which fit together to represent several levels. Front-and-center is the piece representing the nigh-completed King Solomon's Temple, which has various symbols, tools and piles of stones around it, the most prominent of which is a Commandery Cross and Crown. This lighter-colored piece fits onto a framework that is backed by a darker colored structure that houses lights, mechanical figures that move with the time, and a small motor.


Resting on top of the Temple representation is an ornate piece with a large Square and Compasses, into which the actual clock fits. The timepiece itself, which is a separate part, has a Square and Compasses on its hands. Around the

clock opening are several items, including an open Bible, various Masonic working tools, a ladder, two columns, and two workmen on pedestals which flank the edifice on the sides.

The weight of the structure rests on a base that hangs on two hooks, which can be mounted on a wall or on a freestanding frame. The lower part of the base (shown inverted in the picture below) incorporate several carved wooden Masonic symbols, including those of the Scottish Rite, Shrine, and Eastern Star.

Topping off the structure is a goat with a Masonic saddle, peering down and presiding over the entire scene, which only proves that the clock's creator had a sense of humor about the Masonic fraternity.
